Pastor's Message

Embracing our Mission

Last Spring at the same time Peace Lutheran was working on a Long Range Planning process, the Rocky Mountain Synod, one of the Lutheran camps in our Synod, and the ELCA churchwide expression were all conducting their own Strategic Planning processes. I don't know how all of these processes have played out, but I do want to draw your attention to the work of our Rocky Mountain Synod. You might know that Susan Mitchell, a member at Peace Lutheran, serves on the Rocky Mountain Synod Council. She could probably give you more detail on the extensive work the synod has done on this strategic plan. I don't want to focus on the details of the plan. I want to focus on HOW Bishop Gonia and Synod Staff have helped those at the 2017 Synod Assembly to embrace the newly formed Mission Statement that was developed through the process. Bishop Gonia in his address shared the Mission Statement.

“Together, we proclaim and embody God's unconditional love for the sake of the world.”

Now there was nothing all that profound or unique about this Christian Statement of Mission from others. Yet, there was a profound energy and joy that flowed from Bishop Gonia as he talked about what this Mission Statement meant for him and for all the congregations, who are 'The Synod'. Bishop Gonia asked us to physically embrace the mission by what I have termed...the 'Mission Statement Stretch'. The whole room at the assembly stood up and followed the sign-action movement of Bishop Gonia while we spoke the words of the Mission Statement. Sure it was corny, sure it was awkward the first time we did it. And at various points throughout the weekend together, the assembly was invited to remember our shared mission as synod and do the 'Mission Statement Stretch' in response to a wonderful speaker or an inspiring presentation...and well, stretching is important because there is a lot of sitting at a synod assembly. At the end of the assembly, I found I could recite the mission statement and I had a few things that we do as synod I could point to that showed we were living our mission.


This got me thinking about the Mission Statement of Peace Lutheran Church. Even after being here at Peace for three years, I could not speak the words of our Mission Statement from memory. Now don't get me wrong, I know where to find it. It is conveniently printed on the back of your worship bulletin each week. I also wondered if any of the members of our congregation could speak the words of our mission statement by memory. In the weeks since the Synod Assembly, I have set out to embrace our Mission Statement, to allow these words to take flesh in me and guide actions and decisions making.

Having and embodying a common mission is how we as distinct persons bind ourselves together while engaging in our various tasks of ministry. This mission that binds us together is nothing less than the mission that Jesus began and invites us to continue.

This summer we will use the Peace Lutheran Mission Statement in worship. I hope that for you, the action of reading the mission statement will help you embody the words. We want this commitment to flow through our congregation, staff, and mission teams, as together, we express loving service to the Las Cruces community in Jesus' name.

Council Meeting Notes - May 9, 2017

Steve Helmreich and Lisa Van Winkle shared the organ committee's research and recommendation for a new organ console. The organ committee had previously shared this information with Communal Worship, who voted to recommend the proposal to the council. We voted to purchase the new console when we have the cash to complete the purchase.

Pastor Jared shared his attendance at several community meetings and services, including those where BSC received proclamations from the City of Las Cruces and Dona Ana County for their 20 years of service. He will be meeting with the Stewardship for all Seasons team on May 10 to review materials from facilitators.

Deacon Laura's report included that the youth fundraising has gone well, only needing another \$360 to cover the summer camp costs, and she is preparing for VBS June 19-23. At Synod Assembly, she was welcomed during a worship rite as Minister of Word and Service.

The treasurer's report indicated that there is not much change from last month on any of the reports. Our income is greater than last year, but our expenses have increased by more than that increase. The Finance Committee suggests a 5-year plan of where we're going.

We voted to become an internship site with the assistance of funding support from the synod and the seminary.

We voted to follow the recommendation of the memorials committee to purchase a display case for the wall on our left as we enter the building to use for history items, awards, commendations, etc.

We discussed the possibility of a LGBTQ welcoming Sunday coordinating with Pride Week in June.

Update on the New Organ

At the congregational meeting on the 21st, the organ committee reported on the status of the organ. The pipes and speakers are in good shape, but the console itself is beginning to show its age, particularly with respect to the computer and software inside. Thanks to a memorial donation in honor of Laura Roach, we had nearly sufficient funds to replace the organ console with a similar one from Rodgers at about the same cost as the original, but having several times the number of pipe stop sounds available, as well as other upgrades. We were about \$3,300 short of the \$42,000 needed, so the council approved the project once the remaining funds had been accumulated.

Thanks to the generosity of the congregation, within 24 hours after the meeting, the entire amount had been raised, and the purchase will go forward. We hope that the installation can be completed this summer. The Council also approved the purchase of a new organ bench that should last indefinitely. The organ committee (Monte Coleman, Steve Helmreich, Lisa Van Winkle, and Peter Young), the communal worship mission team, and the church council send grateful thanks to God for the generosity of the people in this church.

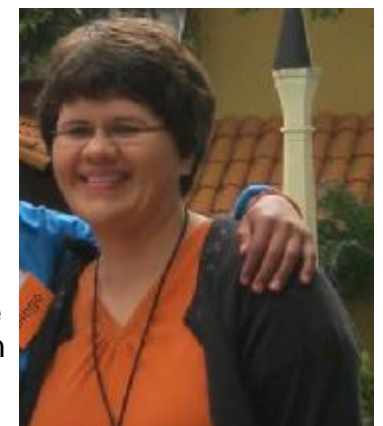


REFLECTIONS, NOTES & NEWS

Reflection shared at BSC 20th Anniversary Celebration by Melissa Primus, First Year BSCer who served at Jardin de los Niños

It's hard to believe that it is just a few months shy of 20 years since I left Iowa on a Greyhound bus bound for Denver. Denver was the stopover, and then on to Las Cruces, NM and a year with the Border Servant Corps.

When I left Iowa, I had no idea what I was getting in to. When I started considering a volunteer year, I applied to the Urban Servant Corps in Denver. Having spent a semester of college in Denver, it was at least a bit familiar to me. But then I was asked if I would consider a year with the Border Servant Corps in Las Cruces – a place I'd never hear of before, in a program that was just getting started.



I can't tell you why I said yes at the time. Maybe a sense of adventure, maybe a feeling that it was my only or best option at the time, maybe an attempt at avoiding the corporate job market for a while longer, maybe some sort of sense of call that saying yes is what I was supposed to do. Reflecting on it now, I'd probably say it was likely a combination of all these things and probably more.

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Whatever the reasons, I said yes and headed to Las Cruces – in some ways the great unknown to this Iowa girl. Border Servant Corps was a new program, and no one really knew what it would look like or how things would go. Las Cruces was unknown to me; Jardin de los Niños was unknown to me; the culture, the climate, the desert, the people, my soon-to-be housemates – all unknown to me. I didn't know what any of this would look or feel like, how any of it would go. And Las Cruces is a long way from Steamboat Rock, Iowa. Unlike college, I didn't have the option to go home for the weekend.

Stepping into all that unknown turned into a year of new experiences, a year of meeting and getting to know new people, a year of learning, a year with challenges and with celebrations, a year of the desert Southwest – it's culture, people, traditions. It was also a year of personal growth and in hindsight a year in which priorities and values formed that became foundational in my life as an adult. Values and priorities that have stuck over the last 20 years.

The tenets of the Border Servant Corps that I experienced – service, faith, community, living simply, social justice – were all fed and nurtured in very focused and intentional ways during my year in Las Cruces. At the end of my year, I'd like to say these elements were rooted within me. A lot of life has happened since, and looking back there are times when these tenets have been alive and well and other times when they yearned for some water, along with times of some dormancy and neglect. The role they have played in my life and the attention I have given them has varied, but they still remain. Service, faith, simplicity, community, seeking justice – these are all a part of who I am, who I want to be, how I want to live.

Until I recently began reflecting on my Border Servant Corps experience in anticipation of my visit to Las Cruces to celebrate the 20 year milestone of the Border Servant Corps, I hadn't connected the dots – how saying yes to Las Cruces deeply impacted and continues to impact my life.

While I might have been seeking a new adventure and avoiding “a real job” when I boarded that bus 20 years ago, I'm convinced that there was more going on than I realized. God had a much bigger purpose for me and the year I lived in the desert. It was a year of volunteering, of giving, but without a doubt I received more than I could have ever imagined and for which I continue to be grateful.

Nursing Notes**JUNE is Men's HEALTH MONTH**

Men's Health Month is designated to increase the awareness of the prevention, and early detection of diseases among men and boys. June gives health care providers, public policy makers, the media, and individuals an opportunity to encourage men and boys to seek regular medical advice and early treatment for disease and injury.

**Who is the Weaker Sex?**

- ◆ 115 males are conceived for every 100 females
- ◆ A male fetus has a greater risk of miscarriage & stillbirth
- ◆ 25% more newborn males die than females
- ◆ 3/5 of AIDS victims are boys
- ◆ Men suffer hearing loss at 2x the rate of women
- ◆ Testosterone is linked to increased LDL (bad cholesterol) & decreased HDL, (the good cholesterol)
- ◆ Men have fewer infection-fighting T-cells, so they have weaker immune systems
- ◆ By the age of 100, women outnumber men 8 to 1 (NYT Magazine, 2013)

Health Facts: Men die at higher rates than women from the top 10 causes of death AND are the victims of over 92% of workplace deaths. (BLS) In **1920**, women lived about 1 year longer than men. **Now**, men, on average, die almost 5 years earlier than women. (CDC)

Depression and Suicide (CDC, 2015)

Often undiagnosed depression in men contributes to men being 4x as likely to commit suicide.

- ◆ Among boys 15-19 years, boys were 3x as likely as girls to commit suicide
- ◆ Among men 20-24 years, men were 4.6x as likely to commit suicide as women
- ◆ Suicide rate for those 65 years and older: men = 31%, women = 5% (meaning of all suicides, 31% were done by men aged 65 and older, 5% were done by women 65 and older).



Prevention: Women are 100% more likely to visit the doctor for annual exams & preventive services than men, (CDC 2001)

Solving the Hunger Crises in New Mexico – Community Forum, June 1 at 6pm

All across New Mexico, Doña Ana County, and the City of Las Cruces, thousands of children, families, seniors, and other neighbors in our communities are living with the reality of hunger in their lives. The latest hunger rates have recently been released, and the number and percentage of New Mexican residents who do not have access to sufficient food on an ongoing and sometimes even daily basis have remained essentially unchanged since the Great Recession that began in 2008. In fact, the severity of hunger has actually increased for many people in our state. Despite national economic indicators that are showing improvements, New Mexico’s hunger and poverty rates remain among the highest for states in our country. This is especially true for children, with more than 1-in-4 struggling with hunger in New Mexico and — Dona Ana County.



Hunger is a serious crisis facing our state, **yet hunger can be solved in New Mexico.** Roadrunner Food Bank provides food assistance and other related services to people in need across the entire state, and has an office in Las Cruces which was established more than 6 years ago. The Food Bank’s revised mission is to

permanently end hunger in New Mexico, and advancing this mission requires far more than sourcing and distributing food for those struggling with hunger. Come hear how Roadrunner Food Bank is strengthening and expanding its services in ways that seek to bring systemic and lasting change and an eventual end to hunger in our state.

Speaker Profile: Wally Verdooren is Chief Development Officer at Roadrunner Food Bank, where he oversees the organization’s fundraising, communications, and advocacy programs. He has more than 30 years of experience working with nonprofit organizations, and also has an extensive background with church-related and interfaith programs and services on local, regional, and national levels. Wally has been with Roadrunner Food Bank since 2015, and immediately prior to his current position worked at Feeding America, the national office for the country’s food bank network. A graduate of Augustana College in Illinois, he also has earned a master’s degree in religion from Yale University Divinity School and a master’s degree in creative writing from the University of Illinois at Chicago.

A Teaching Parish for a Seminary Intern

Peace Lutheran will welcome Amanda “Day” Hefner as a pastoral intern from July 2017 - July 2018. The term to be used when referring to the pastoral intern is *Vicar*. We are happy to welcome Vicar Day!



The turn of events that has led to this decision can only be described as the work of the Holy Spirit. During the Long Range Planning Process last spring, the goal of Peace Lutheran once again having seminary interns came up. Having received the report of the Long Range Planning Team, the congregation and council did not plan or budget money to have an intern in 2017. In the past, this congregation has seen itself as a teaching parish. Teaching parishes are a gift to the whole church, because they are healthy congregations that give contextual experiences for those who are discerning a call to public ministry as Rostered Ministers. In a passing conversation with Bishop Gonia at the New Mexico Bishops Retreat in February, I shared the congregation’s goal of hosting an intern and my openness to being an internship supervisor. In late March, it seemed good to the Holy Spirit that The Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago (LSTC) should approach Bishop Gonia about helping them find a congregation in the borderlands for Vicar Day, who is in a Hispanic emphasis program at the seminary. Bishop Gonia, reflecting on the request and recalling our previous conversation, asked me, and our congregation, to prayerfully consider the request and begin conversations with LSTC. The Peace Lutheran Church Council agreed to move forward with an intern at the May 9th meeting, after several conversations with seminary leaders, Peace Lutheran Executive Committee and Council, and other congregational partners in El Paso. Be careful when you pray Come Holy Spirit!

You might know that hosting an intern and serving as a teaching parish is not free. In fact, the cost is about \$30,000, this cost covers a small stipend, housing costs, utilities, relocating expense. Because the seminary approached us about hosting Vicar Day, they will be covering these costs! This has made the decision of the Church Council so much easier. Peace Lutheran will cover professional expenses and retreat/conference costs, which should total about \$2,000. Your continued generosity to Peace Lutheran as we welcome Vicar Day and continue the excellent ministry is appreciated.

In addition to financial commitments, we will need 4-5 people to serve as an Internship Committee. This committee will meet once a month with Vicar Day, to offer support and reflections on her ministry. The committee will complete quarterly reports for the seminary on the ministry of Vicar Day. If you would like to serve on the Internship Committee, please contact Pr. Jared.

Hosting an intern will not cut the pastoral responsibilities in half. We give Vicar Day a chance to explore all aspects of pastoral ministry in our congregation and help her prepare for a career in ministry. I will have added responsibilities for weekly supervision meetings. Seminary interns often bring excitement and new life to congregations. Please prayer for Vicar Day and our congregation, as we prepare for this exciting and Spirit lead endeavor.

Congregational Meeting Notes - May 21, 2017

We began with prayer offered by Pastor Jared followed by reports given by several committee representatives and ending with elections.

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Treasurer Velma Jesser gave brief comments on the charts on her handout regarding our current finances. She reminded us that we are a generous congregation but we're moving into a traditional slowdown in income during the summer months.

Pastor Jared shared that we will have a seminary intern, Amanda Day Hefner, beginning in July.

Steve Helmreich reported for the organ committee. We have received a large legacy gift and plan to replace the organ console soon. We are about \$3,300 short of the cost at this time. We have a donor who will match about half that amount, so we encourage gifts to enable us to purchase the new console.

Geri Ayers informed us that Emergency Operations Planning Team will have one or two presentations to inform more members on the recommendations they have put together focusing on operational procedures of safety and security for the church in the areas of medical, fire, weather, bomb, active shooter, etc.

Ryan Steinmetz and Diane Haugesag reported on the Synod Assembly, where they were led by the statement, "Together we proclaim and embody God's unconditional love for the sake of the world." They shared many of the ways this is carried out in our synod.

Marcia Starich shared that the Stewardship for All Seasons committee will continue to update us on ways to live more generously and the appeal goals as well as ministry plans and how together we will be carrying out the mission of our church.

Sharon Hartford reported for the Nominations Committee. They encourage people to volunteer for elected positions and other areas of need in the congregation. Council nominees Nancy Apodaca, Lisa Bates, Kendra Hernandez, Sandy Johnson, and Kristin Rogers were elected with 83 ballots cast. Audit Committee nominees Susan Mitchell and Dwight Eggers were elected, and 2018 Synod Assembly Voting Members Dean Ayres and Geri Ayers & Alternates Dick Schriver and Marcia Starich were elected.

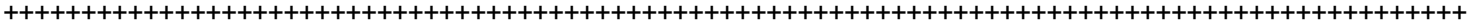
