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Pastor's Message

A Season of Change and Thanksgiving



The fall holiday seasons of November and December can remind us of abundant harvest, the changing of the seasons and for some people it can be very challenging. There is added stress, family expectations, extra cooking, gatherings to attend, gifts to buy and then the figuring out how to pay for all the ancillary expenses for which we had not planned. On top of these things, some people find holidays especially difficult as they experience the pain following the death of a loved one, grief over a divorce, or other events that confront them during the holidays.

It is no secret that Carol Blaschka will be retiring as our Parish Administrator/Bookkeeper at the end of December. She had shared this with me almost a year ago. I still feel a mix of denial and grief. This means a season of change is coming for our congregation. For many people Carol is the face of our staff and our congregation. She has represented us with grace and distinction for 10 years. While Carol (and Damian) will not be leaving Peace Lutheran Church, our office staff will be different and there may even be a grief process that our congregation experiences as we move forward.

As December rolls into January, we will all need to remember patience with our new staff. The new staff will not be Carol. The new staff will have his/her own identity, personality, gifts, and talents. For the new staff that God is preparing for us, I also give thanks!

I give thanks for the Executive Committee and Church Council who have ready been hard at work preparing for this significant transition in the life of our congregation. A step by step plan for finding a new Parish Administrator and Bookkeeper are in place. Job descriptions have been drafted and on October 30th, we began actively seeking applicants. Vicar's Corner: "What's Under Your Iceberg?"

How much do you know about icebergs? I'm sure you've probably heard the phrase "that's just the tip of the iceberg" at some point in life. And you might know that, while icebergs look like huge chunks of ice floating on the ocean's surface, in reality, only about 10% of most icebergs is actually visible above the water. 90% or more extends way, deep down below the surface.

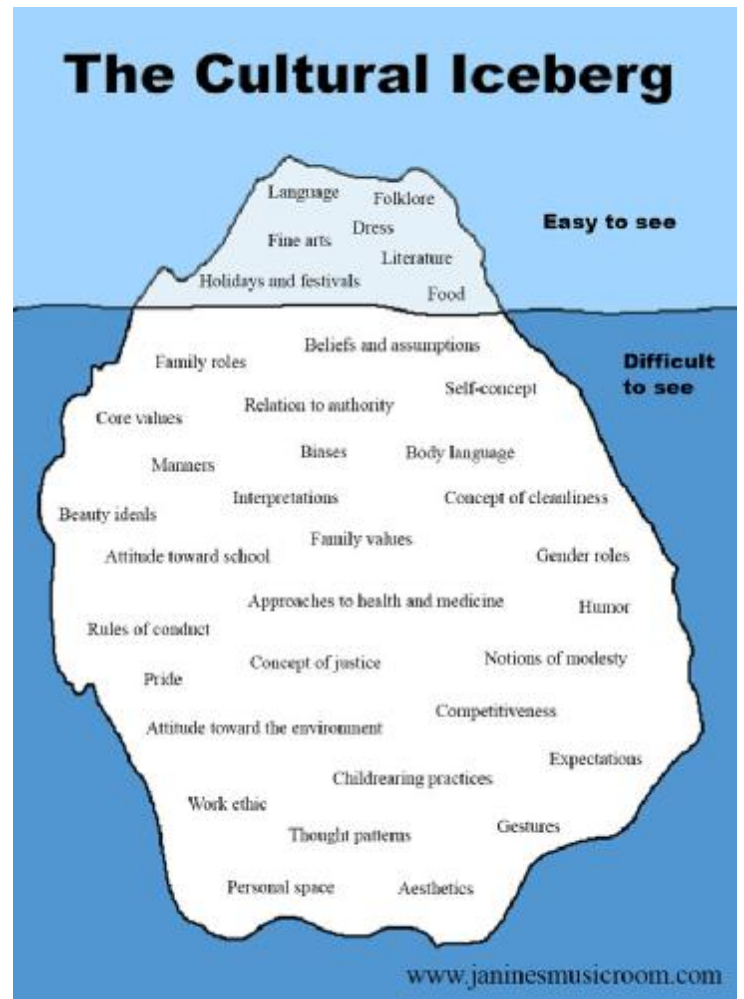
We talked about icebergs in the adult forum series I led last month, centering around themes of accessibility and hospitality to people who are different from us. I thought it was a very helpful illustration that might be beneficial to share with the whole congregation!

Multicultural trainings very frequently make use of the image of an iceberg to talk about culture – I was first introduced to the concept in my Peace Corps training. What does it mean for culture to be like an iceberg? It means that only a small fraction of any given person or group's culture is easily visible to others. Visible culture includes things like food and music, celebrations, sports, dance, language, flags, and so on. If I asked you to tell me about Mexican culture, for example, you could easily talk about enchiladas and tamales, mariachi, quinceañeras, Spanish, Day of the Dead, and many other things.

What is harder to see is the 90% of things below the surface, things that are much more difficult to observe or quantify. Below the surface are our unspoken assumptions and expectations, our values and culturally influenced patterns of behavior. You can see in the image how many of our ideas and traditions and practices are below the surface, not easily seen by others. It is this intangible 90%, floating below the surface, that often makes cross-cultural (or cross-generational, or heck, cross-personal) communication, cooperation, and collaboration so incredibly frustrating and untenable. The 90% below the water often influences the 10% above the water – and when someone else's visible behavior differs from ours, we tend to interpret their behavior based on *our* underlying assumptions, not theirs.

An example I gave to the group of this is attitudes toward stewardship. I worked at a bilingual church in Chicago during my time in seminary where funding the church budget was always a major point of contention. The white, Anglo-European members of the congregation went about their stewardship campaign much as we do – asking members to make annual pledges and handing out envelopes for people to help track their giving. For the Hispanic members of the congregation, however, this model did not work at all. Many of them were undocumented immigrants who had come to Chicago to work and send money home to support their families.

They lacked any kind of legal protections, and therefore had no guarantee of decent wages, or even that they would still be employed in a year. And if they had any money to spare, they sent it home to support their families. So when the time came to make pledges, most of the Hispanic members of the congregation declined to do so. On the surface, this looked to the Anglo members like laziness or a lack of investment – because they did not see the underlying 90%, nor did they stop to reflect on why their own 90%, their own underlying assumptions, led them to assume the worst of other congregational members.

If we are unaware of this 90% of culture – the intangible beliefs and values and assumptions that underlie all of our interactions with one another – it will lead us almost inevitably to conflict with people of other cultures, or at the very least, to separation from people of other cultures. Of course, we can never be fully aware of what underlies another person’s iceberg; only with time and relationship can we begin to understand even a little. However, we can critically self-reflect and wonder about what values and assumptions, beliefs and ideas, are coded deep within each of us, impacting how we act and how we interpret the actions of others. Especially as we move into a festive season of visible cultural celebration, I invite you to reflect on the traditions that you hold most dear and to ask yourself: what’s under your iceberg?

Nursing Notes

November is National Family Caregiver Month. This year's theme is "Caregiving Around the Clock". More than 90 million Americans care for loved ones with chronic conditions, disabilities, disease, or the frailties of old age, according to the Caregiver Action Network. A March 2009 study showed that the value of services family caregivers provide for "free," (for older adults), was **\$375 billion** a year. That was almost **twice as much** as was spent on homecare and nursing homes combined (\$158 billion) per The National Alliance for Caregiving.



Please visit this website to learn some valuable information, support and ideas. It gives help for juggling work and care for a loved one at home... for how best make "during the night" emergency room visits...for how to get a doctor to LISTEN. Probably the most important idea is to know that you are not alone, and that you need to take care of yourself. The website offers that 50% of caregivers suffer from depression. When you need a break, call a sibling to travel in so that you can get away.

Ask a friend to REMIND YOU that you need respite support. The website provides videos, support group information and discussion forums to join (even ones for disease specific groups).

Learn about the 40/70 Rule: by the time you reach age 40 and a loved one is 70, you should have had the "talk". This involves those "I don't want to talk about it" issues such as finances, living settings, decreased mobility and increased health problems, driving, and end of life choices, and so much more.

Talk to your aging parents before it's too late

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Talking to your parents about caregiving, end-of-life decisions and their wishes is important, but many people put it off because they don't know how to begin the conversation. Reduce the stress by starting the discussion with something nonthreatening, like the location of important information and documents, rather than talking about their contents.

Start by taking a financial inventory, which should be updated annually, that includes:

Legal documents: property deeds, wills, trusts, living wills, health care and financial directives, and birth, marriage and military discharge certificates.

Contact information: attorneys, accountants, financial planners, physicians and anyone else who provides financial, legal or medical advice and care.

Current account information: type, number and institution for all financial accounts, including checking, savings, retirement, investment, plus loans and insurance contracts.
