## Pastor's Message

Summertime is usually marked with what's often called 'ordinary time' for churches that follow the same liturgical calendar that we do. This time, the Season after Pentecost, kicks off with Holy Trinity Sunday, the week after Pentecost Sunday, both which we marked in May. I didn't write the calendar or come up with the lectionary myself (nor did I specifically 'plan' to have a baby right as the church enters its 'down' season...), but what a great way to launch this time—on the heels of the gifting of the Holy Spirit, recognizing God as Triune, the Three-in-One leading us into the ordinary time of summer Sabbath (or, just much more traveling?) Just like summer break schedules tend to fill up with trips and activities, not always leaving much time for real REST...paradox fills this 'ordinary' time of the Church.

Part of the paradox is that naming God as Trinity: Three-in-One, is perhaps anything BUT ordinary—it's an *extraordinary* way to understand and experience the Divine. The Trinity is extraordinary because it reveals that within God's *own identity* is a celebration of COMMUNITY. Not just one, but three... three expressions *connecting and communing* as One God, One source of Life. No matter how confusing or muddled our minds get when trying to 'explain' the Trinity, the presence of relationship and community cannot be denied.

Godself (God's own self) is community. Is relationship. Is connection. And we experience God not only in three expressions but in a multitude of ways, a multitude that goes even beyond our comprehension. There is beauty in this—knowing that God cannot be contained into one box, one way of thinking... although we do cling to God as expressed in Jesus Christ: God-with-us who went all the way to death to reveal life and to reveal God's deep solidarity with us; and the Holy Spirit as spoken in a myriad of ways throughout scripture.

As we ponder and respond to who God is and what God has done for us (for you), we too are challenged to live out the Triune-God Community in our own lives. Living into God's own self, through *connecting and communing* as God's community here on earth. We do this by celebrating and committing to community, with and among one another and God's creation (perhaps especially in these summer months!)

What does this connection and communion look like? The Triune God shows up in every card that is sent. Every handshake and hug and 'hello' that is shared on Sunday morning. Every phone call made, prayer lifted, hand outstretched to receive Christ's body. Every food box placed in someone's trunk, every meal shared, every dollar given. Every conversation over tres leches cake and coffee. The Triune God shows up through YOU—your important place in our community—and beyond our congregation into the lives that you touch even beyond the people at Peace.

The Triune God continues to be revealed in community. As we connect and commune with one another. For those of us who walk in the name of Christ, not only is this call to community part of our responsibility as Christians—just as community dwells within God's very identity, community is *who we are*.

So this summer, this 'ordinary' time... take the time to reach out. To make someone's day a little less ordinary and a little more full of connection and community.

We continue to need volunteers in our worship service, especially as ushers, altar care set up and take down, and greeters. Sometimes visitors come, as guests with family members or as travelers seeking to have worship as they continue in their travel plans, or as neighbors from our community.

In June, ask yourself.....is it time now for me to serve as a volunteer? What can I do to help and what is going to be required of me? How difficult is it? If you ever become a bit intimidated to learn something new, please know you will have people to train, guide, and support you See if you can explore what just might work for you as a volunteer! Many of you have beautiful voices. Maybe being part of our choir appeals to you. There is always the hand bell choir to join too. You may encounter your hidden gifts or talents just waiting to be shared with others!

### **GREEN TEAM --**

Peace Lutheran's Green Team is working with a national group called "Interfaith Power and Light." They are a nonprofit organization that inspires and supports a religious response to global warming. The local chapter is called Interfaith Power and Light New Mexico and El Paso Region. The website is (nmipl.org).



The local group meets once a month and are looking to expand their board. Amanda Goodluck from the Green Team is interested in becoming a board member and will be in contact with them. One action item for the group is to write a letter to El Paso Electric and the Public Regulation Commission. The board will decide what advocacy issues will be stated in the letter.

Dwight Eggers, a member of the Green Team, has put in his application to become a community volunteer on the Las Cruces Utility Board. It is a body of 5 community members and two city council representatives that meet monthly to oversee all utilities provided by the city: natural gas, water, solid waste, and sewage treatment. There were 5 applicants for the position, and these have been passed onto the mayor to make the appointment by the end of the month of May. Dwight is also participating in an ad hoc group from Las Cruces that will be pushing for decarbonization in the 2025 Integrated Resource Plan for El Paso Electric.

Dwight also reported on the Renewable Energy Act – the act is originally from 1979 and last amended in 2023. The act sets a target for investor-owned utilities to be generating 40% of their sales with renewable energy by 2025. El Paso Electric (EPE) is struggling to meet the target. They are asking to reallocate some of the Texas renewable capacity to New Mexico. EPE's service area straddles the border, with the Texas' share being dominant. Dwight is also hopeful that the Public Regulation Commission will add pressure for EPE to lower resistance to community and customer-installed solar capacity in the 2025 Integrated Resource Plan.

## AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM Susanna Odegaard

A couple of years ago, I took two of my nieces to the mall to look at dresses for an upcoming dance at school. As we were walking from one store to the next, surrounded by masses of people, many of them around high school age, my older niece looked around thoughtfully and commented, "You know, Auntie, this is one of the only places kids our age can exist for free." To say I was shocked would be an understatement, but as I considered her words and what I knew of our city, I realized she was right.

With the recent renovation and rededication of the Bethlehem Room comes a great deal of opportunity for Peace to reach out to and serve our surrounding community. I believe one of the best ways we could do this is by implementing a safe after school youth program for grades six through twelve. I would love to build a safe third space environment (outside home and school) within Peace for children who often have nowhere to go in the afternoons or any place to safely exist with others of their own age.

We can continue this tradition of Peace's open heart for our community by building an after school program for youth in grades 6-12, regardless of church membership, religion, faith, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or gender identity or expression, where they would feel welcome, safe, and unpressured, and can spend their time productively at no cost to them or their families.

As the first steps toward creating this after school youth program, I am gathering a small team of people to begin planning and gathering resources.
