

Pastor's Message

"No one has to do everything, but everyone has to do something."

This was a mantra that another pastor once used when talking about Stewardship in the Church. A big part of becoming involved in a church community is prayerfully discerning how you will give to God through serving the Church. This is stewardship—of Time, Talent, and Treasure.

Stewardship simply means taking care of things entrusted to you. The first example of stewardship in our tradition can be found back in Genesis, when God gave the earth and animals to the humans to take care of (we could be doing a much better job of this, couldn't we).

For many of us today, the first thing that comes to mind when we hear "stewardship" is money. While offering your financial gifts to the Church IS important; so is offering your gifts of time, skill, and energy.

I fully believe that God has given each one of us gifts to share. Perhaps your time and presence would be appreciated during a visit with one of our homebound members. Maybe your ability to get up early and move around could be useful at the monthly food pantry distribution. Perhaps your outgoing personality would find a good fit at our church doors as a greeter on Sundays, or calling members we haven't seen in awhile. Maybe you like to stay in the background and could help wash some dishes after soup suppers or with property projects around the church. Perhaps you have a way with words and want to advocate for folks by writing letters to our legislators.

This fall you'll hear more about Stewardship. You will be asked to give a little more of your Time, Talent, and Treasure. My prayer is that each person in our congregation will find that ONE thing to get involved with, or that ONE percent of money, time, or energy, that you can contribute to our church.

When no one is doing EVERYTHING, and instead everyone is doing SOMETHING, I believe our church will grow. Not just in numbers on Sundays, but in the ways that we show up for one another and the community. Fewer leaders will burn out and more leaders will emerge. Not only will we become a more active congregation, but each one of us will also be nourished spiritually as we get more involved. And just perhaps, more people will get curious and want to see what Peace Lutheran Church is all about.

- Based on the energy audit, make changes and improvements to improve energy efficiency and conservation
- Utilize renewable energy wherever possible
- Look for ways to compensate for greenhouse gas emissions that cannot be reduced further by purchasing Green Tags or energy credits
- Encourage your members to advocate for public policies that reduce the threat of global warming
- Provide ongoing financial support to the work of NMIPL (\$50/year)

Through this partnership we join over 80 other faith communities in New Mexico who have made this commitment. Benefits of NMIPL membership include access to a variety of educational resources, the opportunity to network with other congregations, and the possibility of qualifying for financial assistance to faith communities who need help in making the transition to energy-saving policies and practices. COMMUNAL WORSHIP - OCTOBER 2024

We find ourselves in October and the Autumn Season with the changing colors of leaves and cooler weather.

Thanks to our many volunteers who graciously give of their time to help make our worship experience meaningful. Know it is always a good time to volunteer and you do have a place here at Peace Lutheran Church!

We are blessed to celebrate Communion each week. Lutherans believe that Jesus Christ is truly present in the meal we call Holy Communion. At our church, all are indeed welcome to receive Communion, whether you are a member or not. Ours is an open table, meaning this holy meal is open to all who wish to receive it.

Some congregations use hosts or wafers and some use bread. We use homemade bread, lovingly baked by our member Karen Harvey. For those who require or prefer to be gluten free, we do provide such wafers. Care is given for no cross contamination.

There is an ancient fourth-century tradition for those receiving the bread to make their hands into a "throne" for the King of kings. To make this throne, place the open right hand upon and across the left hand, thus forming a cross. Both hands are then used to bring the bread to the mouth. Many of us will extend the hand/palm they are most comfortable with or is dominant.

Some congregations may use a Common Cup for the wine, as the oldest practice associated with drinking the wine is from one cup. The one cup symbolizes our unity with Christ. There are, of course, concerns about hygiene. Some congregations choose to use individual glasses and the best practice is to not pre-fill the glasses but to have the wine poured during distribution. At our church we provide individual glasses where the wine is poured by a server during the time for Communion. Some individuals prefer grape juice and some prefer the juice due to medical reasons. Of course the children are able to receive juice for their communion experience. Both wine and juice are offered at our church.

For those not wishing to receive the meal, you can cross your arms over your chest and you will receive a blessing from the pastor.

We have experienced taking Communion in our seats and that option is still available for us. As a congregation, most of us will gather at the rail (some congregations use stations) and that gathering creates a sense of community. We can kneel or stand during the distribution. Standing is actually the more ancient practice. We have a continuous communion which can give us a sense of the communion of saints going before us and those who follow after us. We all receive the bread of life and the wine of grace.

Holy Dates to remember in October include: October 18th St. Luke, Evangelist October 23rd St. James of Jerusalem; October 28th St. Simon and St. Jude, Apostle October 31st Vigil of All Saints

REFORMATION SUNDAY - October 27

Reformation Day commemorates Martin Luther's posting of his 95 Theses in the city of Wittenberg, Germany, on Oct. 31, 1517, which ignited the Protestant reformation. At the heart of the Reformation was a deep conviction that God's mercy and grace in Jesus is given freely to all. We pray that God will continue to awaken, affirm, and strengthen the faith of all people in Christ. Join us for worship on Reformation Sunday. The tradition is to wear RED on this Sunday to mark the Reformation commemoration and the Spirit continuing to move through us.

COUNCIL NOTES

Our October meeting will be on the 8th at 6:30 p.m. at Peace. At our September meeting, we welcomed Pastor Hannah back, elected new officers, and chose new focus areas. The new officers are: Lisa Bates - President; Carol Eggers - Vice-President; and Ross Staffeldt - Secretary. Joel Peterson is our Treasurer.

The focus areas are replacing the Mission Teams and are a "work in progress." In an effort to have our council members serve as liaisons instead of team leaders, we divided the former structure into smaller groups that mirror what is actually happening at Peace. Staying true to our Mission Statement, the current focus areas are: Administration, Maintenance & Stewardship, Worship, Service, Advocacy, Faith Formation, Pastoral Care, Fellowship, Hospitality and Neighborhood Outreach. Each councilor chose/was assigned to a focus area.

In new business, we passed the pastor's housing allowance; discussed insurance needs as more groups use our space; made plans for a fall council retreat; learned about purchase orders from Joel; discussed the need for a Coordinator/Deacon as a way to fulfill some tasks that are being left undone and discussed the upcoming budget for 2025. The new council was installed on 9/22 during worship.

AMENDMENT TO A CONSTITUTION BYLAW

The Council has approved the following change to our Constitution. We will vote as a congregation at our November meeting to accept this updated By-Law.

Update of description of treasurer's duties in our constitution:

Current statements under C12:05.02 The treasurer shall

- A) Pay all properly authorized expenses of this congregation by check;
- B) Keep a record of all income received and expenditures made in books which shall be and always remain the property of the congregation."

to be changed to

- A) Pay all properly authorized expenses of this congregation by check or by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT);
- B) Keep a record of all income received and expenditures made in books and electronic records which shall be and always remain the property of the congregation."


