## Pastor's Message Rev. Hannah DiPasquale

"When something hits close to home, it affects us deeply. The stories and scripture of Advent are tender, heavy with emotion, and vulnerable. We hold the memories and truths of this season close to our hearts." (from Sanctified Art "Close to Home" Devotional)

Our theme for this year's Advent season—*Close to Home*—invites us to consider where we make our home, while God prepares to make a home among us as Emmanuel, God-with-us. And, it invites us dwell in what it might mean for something to hit 'close to home' and the feelings that often come with it... heaviness, nostalgia, uneasiness, joy, curiosity.


This Adent season, there is space for whatever you are feeling. We anticipate Jesus' arrival with a hope, an expectation, that God will show up. And, we express the honesty of the moments when we are a little less sure that God will show up.

Gather with us this season to be reminded that God is with-us. That even when something feels a little too 'close to home,' God is in the midst of all of it.

Part of why I felt drawn to this theme is because many in our community have experienced very real upheavals of 'home,' or what they thought to be home—moves, displacement, losses that have forced them to relocate. Additionally, many in our community have lost other aspects of 'home,' be it the security of a job, the companionship of a loved one who has died, the safety nets that are unknown with the most recent election. Different things are starting to feel a bit more personal—a bit *close to home*—and we are called especially in uncertain times to lean into community and to share the good news of love and grace that we have in Christ.

Whatever this season brings up for you, know that you are welcome to show up as your full self to Peace Lutheran Church. Whatever you are feeling, your emotions are welcome. Whatever you are longing for, your hunger is welcome. When you especially need a place to rest, or a glimpse of hope—please come. Join us for worship or for food or for whatever else might be going on. You don't have to be hollyjolly; there's a good chance when you come to church someone will be ready to meet you with a smile or a warm hug.

"I think we share a collective homesickness. It feels like nostalgia. It looks like the trauma hiding in our past. It can turn into foreboding fear that robs us of real joy. But in this image and in Jesus' words, I see a call to resilience despite the difficult realities that confront us. I see a longing so deep that it keeps us reaching—for a home restored, for comfort renewed, for the fruit that is sure to come."

#### **COMMUNAL WORSHIP - DECEMBER 2024**

Advent begins on December 1. Advent comes from the Latin word, *adventus*, which means coming or arrival. We wait and remember during Advent the story in Scripture of the birth of Jesus. If you ever look at the night sky, away from the city lights of your neighborhood, you can see a multitude of stars. Maybe it will be very quiet as you stargaze. As in ancient times, with no lights or noise from a big population, Mary was waiting for her child to be born. His birth, celebrated by angels singing in glorious joy to an audience of simple shepherds in a nearby field, is a true love story, a gift from God to His people! Emmanuel is now with us. And we are richly blessed!

I believe that the best way to truly celebrate Christmas, the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, is to fill this time intentionally with faith – prayers, special advent reading plans (like reading a chapter of Luke once a day in December so all 24 chapters are read by Christmas day), faith-related activities, and, of course, Advent and Sunday worship services. Some people have special time set aside for Scripture reading, maintaining a home Advent wreath as well as other cherished traditions. What matters is having Christ in your mind and heart during this wonderful season of Advent.

Let's keep in mind that some people are not perhaps in a holiday sort of mood. There is grief and the holidays are difficult times. We hold those missing/departed loved ones or situations in our hearts and prayers. We give grace to others during the holiday (just as we should all year long). Perhaps you or someone you know might want to attend the Longest Night service here at church on December 21, a Saturday and the night of the Winter Solstice. Often this service is referred to as the Blue Christmas service as it is a special service that allows space for grief in this season.

Christmas Eve is on Tuesday this year and it will be a wonderful service. Christmas Day on Wednesday will be a time of breakfast, fellowship and prayer. While some travel for the holidays, please join us if you are here and able to do so. Bring a friend!



#### A NEW GREEN HOLIDAY TRADITION: Tofu Ham and Turkey

Every family has their own special traditions around Christmas. A big focal point for mine was food. One of the foods was my grandmother's Christmas Crackers that some of you may remember from last December's Fellowship Hour. We also eat oyster stew every Christmas Eve and a big ham roast on Christmas Day.



My husband, Clark, didn't grow up in a church. I attribute his family's relative lack of a holiday meal tradition to this fact. Sometimes his mother would make enchiladas on Thanksgiving, but they never held too much reverence for it. However, his father did grow up in the Seventh Day Adventist church. That means my father-in-law and his immediate family never ate pork. He still has a slight aversion to it, and he carried that pork avoidance into Clark's childhood.

Since moving out of my parents' house I have tried to live as climate-conscious as possible. Reducing my meat consumption was one big step. Why shouldn't we continue this meat reduction into the holidays?

What a better time to try this new way of eating than during our first Christmas together, in 2020, right in the midst of a big COVID wave! Without wanting to infect our parents, we spent Christmas together, just the two of us. We went to Sprouts and bought a Tofurky Roast with Wild Rice Stuffing and the Tofurky Ham Style Roast.

We promise you that it tastes nothing like the chewy tofu packages you get at the store or eat at an Asian restaurant. Tofurky has the texture of a smooth meat that tastes like it's been marinated in real animal flavors. Clark and I love this tofu "meat" so much that we've decided to make it a new tradition. We now eat real turkey on Thanksgiving and the Tofurkey and Tofu Ham on Christmas Day!

The Tofu Ham tasted so real to Clark and his father, that they couldn't eat too much of it due to their Adventist roots. So don't let the fear of a new vegan food scare you! I urge all of you to try one of these meat substitutes this holiday season, even if it's still alongside your normal roast. If you do not have solar, the Green Team asks that you consider if this a path for you.

#### THE GREEN TEAM'S VEGAN AND VEGETARIAN COOK-OFF!

Reducing your carbon footprint can be as easy as reducing meat in your diet. However, it can be difficult to find tasty vegetarian and vegan dishes. If you have a special vegetarian or vegan recipe, bring some for the congregation to sample after worship on January12, 2025! We will hold a vote for the best food, and maybe even give out a prize!

#### COMMUNAL WORSHIP - JANUARY 2025

Happy New Year! It's a time to consider new beginnings, new opportunities to enhance both your life and others. Palms open for blessings, hands and hearts serve the Lord.

January 1 is known as the feast day of Mary, Mother of God. We always think of her beautiful surrender to God and steadfast love of her son Jesus.

Epiphany, which actually starts on January 5, often celebrated on the 6th, marks the date when the Magi came to pay homage to baby Jesus. It is often called Three Kings Day. The Magi or kings were important symbolically as they illustrate that Jesus was the king of all kings who came for the Jews and the Gentiles. Epiphany is one of the oldest Christian feasts, celebrated since the end of the second century, even before the Christmas holiday was established. It is also known as the Twelfth Night. Epiphany means manifestation or showing forth and refers to the church season that follows the day. We celebrate Epiphany to remember we too are invited to witness the life of Jesus and be blessed as we begin a new year.

Also on Epiphany is the tradition of "Chalking the Door". This is a centuries-old way, believed to be an Anglican tradition, to celebrate and mark the occasion with God's blessing of our lives and homes with sacred signs. It set the houses apart as places of Christian hospitality, as safe places of the Kingdom of God in the world and as places of healing and rest. Chalk is used because it is an ordinary substance of the earth and, while it will fade with weather and time, we will remember the reason for it. The doorposts of homes are chalked each year with the year and the letters C+M+B which is Latin for Christus Mamsionem Benedicat which means "May Christ Bless this Home". The letters can also mean the names of the Magi who visited baby Jesus: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. So in 2025 it is: 20+C+M+B+25
