Pastor's Message

Rev. Hannah DiPasquale

"Peace is service."

Amanda, one of our new council members and liaison to our service ministries, defined our congregation so well. We don't just DO service; we ARE service. Serving others is our response to God's gift of grace so freely given to us. We cannot be people of faith and NOT serve one another. And, service is a huge part of our congregation's history and identity.

I have experienced Peace to be a thoughtful, welcoming, dynamic congregation where service truly is at the heart of who we are. We experience this at the Table we gather around every Sunday—not just to be filled ourselves, but to strengthen and empower us to take out into the world the same grace and hope that we receive at the Lord's Supper. We take the body of Christ out into the world by *being* the body of Christ—the hands and feet of Jesus in the world.

We are exploring the possibility of calling a deacon to help us do just that. A deacon (from *diakonia*, a word derived from the concept of waiting on tables) would hold us accountable to our commitment of being Christ's hands and feet in the world, to remind us that we don't just exist for ourselves, and to help organize us around our mission to share God's grace especially through service to the community.

Sometimes I wonder if we get caught into thinking that church is some sort of service provider for *me*—it's there when I need it for something: a pastor to do a funeral or wedding, a good message when I'm feeling down, a hot meal with caring company when I'm hungry or in need of friendship. All of these things are good. And...I think there is more to being church. A sort of *mutuality in relationship* that invites us to discover God's presence not only through the consumption of other people's gifts and calls; but also through serving others with *our own* gifts and calls.

So, I encourage you to ask yourself: Why do I come to church? Why am I a part of this congregation?... Do I come to church just to have *my* needs met? Or am I also giving of myself and my gifts to serve others?

You have something to offer. God has instilled in us a variety of gifts, empowered by the same Spirit (1 Corinthians 12). What gift is God activating in you this season? What is that *one thing* God is inviting you to get involved in, to give a little more of, to try?

HOME SOLAR POWER -- GREEN TEAM -- by Dennis Rich



New Mexico is one of the best spots in US and the world for generating electricity via a solar array. The great part is that with Federal and State subsidies, the conversion from being an energy user to an energy producer will likely cost you nothing or even put money in your pocket.

Questions people ask themselves before putting in a solar array:

- What upfront or downpayment costs will be needed? Generally, it doesn't require any upfront money. The solar installer is generally able to loan you the entire amount at a reasonable rate.
- Will the cost of electricity continue to rise? It is likely electricity costs will continue to rise, making your system more profitable.
- ♦ What are the subsidies on a solar array? Currently the Federal subsidy is 30% and the New Mexico subsidy is another 10%. You can usually apply this to the loan or not. On a 40 thousand dollar array the subsidy is 16 thousand dollars this year. The payment on the loan is about equal to your current electric bill if you apply the subsidies to the loan.

Over the last year my array generated 10.9 Mkh of electricity. What does that mean? If that was generated by fossil fuels it would have created 7.8 tons of CO2. That is a meaningful amount of CO2.

If you do not have solar, the Green Team asks that you consider if this a path for you.


ATTENTION THRIVENT MEMBERS

YOUTH PROGRAM UPDATE

The first thing I want to do is extend thanks from the youth program team for all the support given by this congregation as we work to create this program. Without your support and help, bringing this program to life would be impossible.

Now, for a few updates. We have named the program Ana's Place in honor of my niece who inspired it. We have also narrowed our focus from sixth through twelfth grade to just sixth through eighth grade. As we researched needs in the community, it became clear that specifically middle school students are in the most need of a safe place to be after school. We are currently planning a start date of January 9, 2025, with the program running every Thursday and Friday from 4-6 p.m.

At the moment, we are working on several areas to prepare for beginning the program. We are creating a policy handbook for families, students, and volunteers that incorporates current church policies and any additional policies as needed to fit the program. We are also in the process of readying the Bethlehem Room and Room 106 for the participants to use. We plan to have it ready by November 15, when we will be holding an open house for families and students so they can both see what the program will be like and register.

One of our greatest challenges to the program has been determining how to transport students from school to the church. We discovered our solution through another church's elementary after school program - they were able to have parents request a bus stop be added at the church on the day their program runs. We're planning to do the same.

IT'S TIME TO BUY SHOES FOR JARDIN DE LOS NIÑOS

We at Peace have been gathering shoes for the children of Jardin de Los Niños for many years. A bit of history for those of you who are new: In 1995 Sister Beth Daddio and Sister Ann Waldschmitt requested the use of the Bethlehem Room and two classrooms of our building. Their purpose was to provide services for young homeless and near homeless children and their parents. The program grew and in 2001 Jardin moved to a good-sized facility on the Community of Hope Campus on Amador Avenue where other services to unhoused people are provided. They now serve more children and families than we can collect shoes for, but they depend on us to do what we can.

Watch for the list of children which will appear in the entryway early in November. Choose a child, or several children, sign the list, find the matching label, place it on a shoe tag, and take it with you to a shoe store. If shopping is not for you, your monetary donation – identified for shoes – will be welcome. Others can do the shopping.

Shoes should be brought to church iin their box, unwrapped (with the labeled tag attached) by the end of November (date will be posted by the tree).

They stopped in several cities in our territory, ending in Denver for the Installation of our new bishop, Rev. Meghan Johnston Aelabouni on October 5.

The guests were housed overnight at Janaan's House, the Border Servant Corps house about 3 blocks from here. COUNCIL MEETING NOTES

Council met on October 8. They heard an update from Susanna Odegaard about planning for the after-school program. They approved the 2025 Budget Draft to be presented to and approved by the congregation on November 10. They approved Mission Endowment Fund disbursement requests from the MEF committee; discussed the possibility of calling a part-time Deacon and presenting this to the congregation; and discussed the Gather & Grow stewardship push and the special worship service on November 10.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING - NOVEMBER 10

Plan to stay after our special service on Sunday, November 10 for our fall congregational meeting. At this meeting we will approve the 2025 budget, including funds for calling a part-time deacon. We will approve one update to the PLC Constitution (see below). We will also hear more about the Gather & Grow push and restructuring of the ministry focus areas.

AMENDMENT TO A CONSTITUTION BYLAW

The Council has approved the following change to our Constitution. We will vote as a congregation at our November meeting to accept this updated By-Law.

Update of description of treasurer's duties in our constitution:

Current statements under C12:05.02 The treasurer shall

- A) Pay all properly authorized expenses of this congregation by check;
- B) Keep a record of all income received and expenditures made in books which shall be and always remain the property of the congregation."

to be changed to

- A) Pay all properly authorized expenses of this congregation by check or by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT);
- B) Keep a record of all income received and expenditures made in books and electronic records which shall be and always remain the property of the congregation."

CALLING A DEACON

On October 20th our Council President presented about calling a part-time Deacon (minister of Word & Service). Please see the information below about what calling a Deacon might mean and what they would do.

Peace Lutheran Church Coordinator of Community Connection (possibly served by a Deacon) DRAFT job description

Description: This person will be responsible for the overall planning, development and coordination of Peace Lutheran Church's outreach efforts, including communications and community service. This person will have a visible commitment to Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit and one whose life demonstrates said commitment. Participation in Sunday morning worship is expected, with occasional preaching if this position is filled by a rostered Deacon. This person will need to complete a background check and Safe Haven training.

Qualifications: This person will possess and demonstrate:

- A commitment to service and justice.
- Interpersonal skills to work effectively and cooperatively with staff and volunteers.
- A sense of the 'big picture' of church and a willingness to engage in visioning and long-term planning.
- Organizational skills and methods of tracking goals and accomplishments.
- The ability to communicate via diversity of means (electronically, in-person, phone, etc) and with a diversity of people and backgrounds.
- The ability to organize events, equip volunteers, and share the church's ministry with the larger community.
- Proficiency in navigation of websites, social media, livestreaming, and common digital communication tools.
- The ability to create visually appealing and effective digital content and promotional materials.
- A willingness to be flexible and adapt to rapidly changing priorities and demands.

Principal Duties:

- Enhance and coordinate the church's online presence and electronic communications.
- Maintain the church's website, social media, and YouTube channel. Create and share content, promoting current events and service opportunities.
- Determine ways to advertise to the larger community and implement these methods.
- Design and send a weekly e-mail to be shared with the church community with pertinent announcements and events.
- Research and develop other effective tools for communication within the congregation and to the broader community.
- Connect with existing community partners, such as Border Servant Corps, Lutheran Family Services, Lutheran Advocacy of NM, etc; and determine needs and possibilities for partnership and collaborative ministry.
- Connect with ecumenical and interfaith partners and determine ways to be present in the community together with them.
- Empower, equip, and encourage church members to be actively involved in the community.
- Coordinate outreach efforts, community service projects, and advocacy events.
- Explore other opportunities for service and advocacy.

Who is a Deacon?

- Deacons are Ministers of Word & Service. Pastors are Ministers of Word & Sacrament.
- Deacons are an ordained roster in the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America). This
 means that they are specifically trained, educated, and called to serve as leaders in our church.
- **Deacons serve in a variety of settings**, including congregations, hospitals, and schools. Many deacons serve as chaplains, youth ministers, educators, community service leaders, administrators, and more. A deacon's ministry responds to the needs of a specific community or context.
- From Peace Lutheran Church Constitution Section *C9.23:

Consistent with the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, every minister of Word and Service shall:

- a. Be rooted in the Word of God, for proclamation and service;
- b. Advocate a prophetic diakonia that commits itself to risk-taking and innovative service on the frontiers of the Church's outreach, giving particular attention to the suffering places in God's world;
- c. Speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, calling for justice and proclaiming God's love for the world, witnessing to the realm of God in the community, the nation, and abroad;
- d. Equip the baptized for ministry in God's world that affirms the gifts of all people;
- e. Encourage mutual relationships that invite participation and accompaniment of others in God's mission;
- f. Practice stewardship that respects God's gift of time, talents, and resources;
- g. Be grounded in a gathered community for ongoing diaconal formation;
- h. Share knowledge of this church and its wider ministry of the gospel and advocate for the work of all expressions of this church; and
- i. Identify and encourage qualified persons to prepare for ministry of the gospel.

Why would PLC call a Deacon?

- Peace's commitment to community service. "Peace is service." Service and love for our community truly are at the heart of this congregation. A gift and challenge of PLC is the fact that many of our church members, including some of our most active members, spend a lot of the year traveling, which leads to inconsistent involvement for service ministries. Additionally, community needs have shifted especially since Covid, and our internal knowledge of the needs of the community requires some updating. A deacon would help us listen to the needs of the community, organize ways for us to respond, and offer consistent leadership.
- Peace's commitment to advocacy. We are called to act on behalf of our most vulnerable neighbors, including upcoming legislation and other action items we can engage in. Additionally, there are opportunities within our local institutions and leaders to advocate for the least among us, as well as build bridges with our neighbors of differing socio-economic status. A deacon could help us keep up with the ways we can advocate.
- Peace's commitment to hospitality, inclusion and welcome. "The Church is the only society on earth that exists for the benefit of non-members" (William Temple). Everyone is invited to everything we do. A deacon can hold us accountable to our commitment to being a church-for-thecommunity and help us ensure that all we do is invitational to the larger community and not just current members.
- Peace's need for improved communication. We communicate not only one another within our congregation but also to the larger community so that the wider world knows what we are about. A deacon could help us think critically about how we communicate who we are and what we do. Good, consistent communication is also critical to being invitational and inclusive, as well as building stronger connections with the community. A deacon could coordinate our public communication efforts, including website, social media, emails; as well as promoting worship, events, and ministries via other public means.

Why not just hire a lay person?


Deacons are specifically called and trained to connect church with the world, and Peace could benefit greatly from that focus of a call—and, really, it's already part of who we are as a congregation. A deacon would help us move even more of our ministry outside our walls and remind us that we are sent out to proclaim God's love for the world and serve the world in the name of Christ.

The last column now is <u>percent of the YTD</u> Budget, not of the entire year as previously shown.


