Pastor's Message Rev. Hannah DiPasquale

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

After a very long Lent, it almost feels like a relief to air our "Alleluias!" again. There definitely is something meaningful about the discipline that we practice in Lent, drawing near to God-with-us as we walk with Jesus toward the cross through extra prayer and fasting, remembering our mortality, serving one another in our full humanity. And, there is meaning in the freedom that Easter offers—reminding us that God's grace abounds and new life wins the day. Alleluia!

As I shared in my Easter sermon, we still find Jesus on the cross—in cages, on the street, in other places of oppression and violence that still exist today. AND, we find Jesus in moments of resurrection that constantly surround us as well.

I find Jesus in gratitude. Giving thanks is one way to resist powers of sin, death, and evil—making space for gratitude helps us lean into the resurrection joy revealed in the Easter promise. And gratitude reminds us just how connected to one another we are.

Rocky Mountain Synod Assembly - May 22-24, 2025



Pastor Hannah, Deacon Anna, Bob Treulich and Susan Yarne will be attending this year's RMS Assembly on behalf of Peace. Lynette Schurdevin will also be in attendance as a Synod Council Member. The event will take place at the Embassy Suites in Albuquerque with the theme *Dios Está Aquí - God Is Here!*

At this year's Assembly, we will experience Worship and Bible Study; Holy Stories from around the Synod; Interactive workshops on new ministry models, transitions, synod budget, multicultural ministries, and more; Special Guests & Plenaries (large group gatherings); and ABQ Adventure Opportunities. We will also vote on the business of the synod such as finances and electing a new Synod Vice-President and other committee members. We look forward to spending time with our siblings from all over the Rocky Mountain Synod (Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, and El Paso) and with our new Bishop.

Additionally, the two days before the Assembly, Deacon Anna and Pastor Hannah will also participate in an **Immigration Summit**, of which Pr Hannah is also a part of the planning committee. This summit is an optional pre-assembly conference with the goal to deepen our understanding of the immigration challenges as well as strategize how to faithfully accompany our immigrant siblings. Using the framework of *accompaniment*, we will learn from each other, share our knowledge, plan how to engage in this important issue and network across the synod for the flourishing and dignity of our immigrant siblings. Author and priest Cristina Rathbone will be our plenary speaker and we will hear from folks around the synod working on the border, in advocacy, and working directly with migrants.

COMMUNAL WORSHIP - MAY 2025

Here we are in May, full of exciting activities such as high school and college graduations and upcoming vacations. It is a notable month too in the life of the church. I will refer you to our Christ in Our Home devotional booklet. May 1st is a day to remember the Apostles Philip and James as both of their relics were reportedly interred in the new Church of the Holy Apostles in Rome on that date in 560 A.D.

May 4th is noted for Monica, the mother of Augustine who will later become a saint in the Catholic Church. May 4th is a date for her feast as she was instrumental in his conversion on May 5th. Legend cites she cried each night for her son and prayed for him daily. His conversion to Christianity saw him become an important bishop, theologian and philosopher whose writings shaped Christian theology and doctrine, especially his writings on grace. Martin Luther saw Augustine as an important figure in his understanding of salvation and grace.

May 14th we commemorate the Apostle Matthias. He was the only Apostle not chosen by Jesus as he replaced Judas among the remaining eleven Apostles.

Another date of important is noted as May 31st, the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth, her relative. We find the young, pregnant Virgin Mary making a journey to the hill country to visit the pregnant Elizabeth who had been barren for years. Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, recognizes Mary as now being the mother of her Lord. One can only imagine the happiness these two women shared in such important times of their lives.

May is also a time for elections for church council and there will be a congregational meeting for that so please attend if possible.

For all those who have volunteered to help in various capacities of our worship experience, thank you! For those volunteers who helped make Holy Week and the Easter celebration so special, your efforts are very appreciated by many; thank you! We all are blessed to enjoy the beautiful music experiences from our talented Music Minister Jieun Newland.

THE 10TH ANNIVERSARY of the release of Laudato Si'

Laudato Si', is a 184-page letter (encyclical) written by Pope Francis that was published in May of 2015. It focuses on care for the natural environment and all people, as well as broader questions of the relationship between God, humans, and the Earth.



Francis says that instead of viewing humanity as having "dominion" over the earth, we must see that everything is interconnected and that all of creation is a "kind of universal family." Nature cannot be seen as something apart from humanity, or merely the place where we live. He says that our social and environmental crises are thus one complex crisis that must be solved holistically.

Laudato Si' had a profound impact within and outside the Catholic Church, but eight years later in 2023, Pope Francis published Laudate Deum. In the 73 paragraphs of Laudate Deum, Francis calls for speedier action against the climate crisis and condemns climate change denial. Laudate Deum serves as proof that Francis feels his message has not been heard. "Eight years have passed since I published the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si', when I wanted to share with all of you, my brothers and sisters of our suffering planet, my heartfelt concerns about the care of our common home. Yet, with the passage of time, I have realized that our responses have not been adequate, while the world in which we live is collapsing and may be nearing the breaking point."

Locally, the Laudato Si' steering committee met on Saturday, April 12, at Holy Cross Retreat Center. The committee agreed to commemorate the 10th anniversary of Laudato Si at the 6:30 pm Mass on Wednesday, May 28, at the Holy Cross Retreat Center, 600 Holy Cross Road, Mesilla Park. Also, the Laudato Si committee will also have a table at the Franciscan Festival of Fine Arts Labor Day weekend, August 30-31, at the Holy Cross Retreat Center and the committee will talk about and hand out a card with the seven goals of Laudato Si'.


SAVE THE DATE – CONGREGATIONAL MEETING – SUNDAY MAY 4TH
